# Summer @ the Lab

The Jacob Burns Film Center (JBFC) is committed to inspiring the next generation of engaged citizens and visual storytellers through fun and engaging educational experiences. Founded in 2001, we show hundreds of films a year in our art house theater and have pioneered a unique approach to viewing and creating media. We are thrilled to present the ninth year of Summer @ the Lab, an array of exciting opportunities for kids and teens. Through this program, campers write, direct, and edit original projects; learn to enjoy movies in new ways; and spend time with some of the most interesting people around.

### **LAB CAMP**

### **Entering Grades 3-10**

Explore different mediums in each two-week session. Take advantage of all the resources of our state-of-the-art facility—the screening room, sound stage, recording studio, animation studio, and so much more—as you dive deep into your creations!

One great summer. Three great themes.

### **VIDEO PRODUCTION**

Bring your story to life.

In every session, campers create several video projects—and the entire production process is in their hands. Participants use professional cameras, audio recording equipment, and editing software (Adobe Premiere Pro). They also participate in acting workshops. Each age group applies different visual and audio concepts to their productions, adding depth and complexity to their ideas and stories.

#### ANIMATION

Absolutely anything is possible in an animated world.

Campers make magic happen by collaborating on fantastical stories that animation makes possible. Grades 3–8 explore stop-motion animation with DSLR cameras and the professional editing software Dragonframe. Grades 9–10 take the plunge and delve into the more complicated world of computer keyframe animation using Adobe After Effects and Adobe Photoshop.

# IMMERSIVE STORYTELLING

Bring your audience into your story.

Today's storytellers can take advantage of cuttingedge technology to transform a simple viewing experience into an interactive experience. Campers experiment with 360° video cameras, stereo microphones, and sensors to craft one-of-a-kind stories where the audience becomes part of the action.

Each session focuses on a different combination of themes and subjects, generating new creative collaborations and hands-on experiences. Small groups (maximum: 10) join in activities guided by our renowned faculty and assisted by trained counselors. We maintain a ratio of one adult to every five campers.

### **Lunch and Snacks**

Bring your own lunch, morning snack, and beverage. All campers enjoy two 15-minute breaks: one in the morning and another in the afternoon. JBFC provides popcorn for afternoon snack.

During lunchtime, weather permitting, counselors walk campers to a nearby park with a playground and a field. Campers should wear appropriate footwear and bring a hat. With parental permission, campers in grades 9—10 may leave the Media Arts Lab to buy lunch and then return to the Lab or join the younger campers in the park.

### **Additional Hours**

Campers may be dropped off early—at 8:00 am—for an additional fee of \$100 per week and/or picked up late—at 5:00 pm—for an additional fee of \$100 per week. Supervision is available during early drop-off and late pickup, but there are no structured activities at those times.

# **SUMMER CO-OP**

### **Entering Grades 9–12**

Make a collaborative movie this summer through our popular teen program, Creators' Co-op! Over three weeks, teens work in groups to pitch, script, shoot, and edit an original narrative short.

Begin with a one-week immersion into a series of specialized workshops led by JBFC faculty and guest professionals.

With the Lab as your resource for equipment and editing, crews spend the next two weeks shooting and editing independently with the support of a mentor to make a short film.
