

Step into Spring with a Riveting Slate of Events at the Jacob Burns Film Center

The JBFC's compelling spring schedule includes the return of Jonathan Demme's Rarely Seen Cinema, a retrospective of the beloved Agnès Varda's work, the return of The Meditative Life series, the 2020 Westchester Jewish Film Festival, Q&As following powerful documentaries, live broadcasts of stage shows, and more.

Pleasantville, NY – Jan. 29, 2020 – The <u>Jacob Burns Film Center (JBFC)</u>, a nonprofit cultural arts center and one of the most successful art house theaters in the country, announced today a variety of unique, compelling, and one-of-a-kind events, series, and screenings for spring 2020. With special events and thought-provoking Q&As featuring filmmakers, actors, activists, writers, academics, historians, and more, there's something for everyone to see this spring at the JBFC.

Highly Anticipated Events Include:

• Feb. 18: <u>Global Watch</u> screening of <u>Midnight Traveler</u>, followed by a Q&A with filmmaker/2018 JBFC Artist-in-Residence Emelie Mahdavian (via Skype) & JBFC Senior Film Programmer Andrew Jupin.

When the Taliban puts a bounty on Afghan director Hassan Fazili, he is forced to flee the country with his wife and two young daughters. Capturing their uncertain journey, Fazili shows firsthand the dangers facing refugees and a family's love. We are proud to show this award-winning, influential documentary, which was written, produced, and edited by Emelie Mahdavian, a 2018 Artist-in-Residence at the JBFC under our Creative Culture program.

- Feb. 23: Jonathan Demme's Rarely Seen Cinema screening of Jo Jo Dancer, Your Life is Calling, followed by a Q&A with Gina Duncan, VP of Film at the Brooklyn Academy of Music. Over the 12 years he hosted Rarely Seen Cinema at the Burns, Jonathan Demme often discussed his "dream guests," including Toni Morrison, who selected Richard Pryor's 1986 semiautobiographical feature for her screening—a brutal, hilarious, and poignant testimony to Pryor's comic brilliance. Morrison's visit never came to pass, so we are sharing this film to celebrate and remember both Demme and Morrison during their shared birthday month.
- Feb. 25: Children of God screening, followed by a Q&A with producer Richard LeMay Set against the backdrop of a nation grappling with violent homophobic crime, Bahamian director Kareem Mortimer's debut narrative feature tells the stories of three very different individuals, all heading for the spectacularly beautiful and tranquil island of Eleuthera, each with a different reason for escaping current circumstances. Presented in collaboration with Creatively Speaking, a year-round film series programmed by Michelle Materre.

Other Highlights of the Spring Season at JBFC Include:

• <u>Retro Revival</u> presents <u>Varda: a Retrospective</u> Feb. 28—Mar. 12 Agnès Varda was a true original. When she passed away last year—after making nearly 50 films in practically every conceivable genre—Richard Brody wrote in *The New Yorker*, "She was so far ahead of the world that she had to wait for it to catch up to her." We're proud to present this retrospective of her dazzling, uninhibited, entertaining, and endlessly unconventional work. And since so many of us here at the Burns are Varda fans, several staff members will host Reel Talks, informal discussions after selected screenings. In the week leading up to the retrospective—Feb. 21 through 27—we'll screen Varda's final film, <u>Varda by Agnès</u>, a characteristically playful, profound, and personal summation of the director's own brilliant career. • Dance on Film: Cunningham (Feb. 21–27)

Feb. 27: Q&A with Dance on Film host Peter Pucci with dancers/choreographers Gus Solomons, Meg Harper, and Jennifer Goggans of The Cunningham Trust

Celebrating Merce Cunningham's 100th year, this breathtaking film brings the legendary choreographer and his dances to life, immersing audiences in a 3D experience that puts them "there, in the room, with these bodies in motion" (*New Yorker*).

Our annual series explores not only meditation and mindfulness, but also the many ways in which we investigate different realms of the human experience. Immerse yourself in provocative ideas via deep discussions with guests including meditation teacher Tracy Cochran, who'll tackle <u>Heart of a Dog</u> (Feb. 12) and <u>Spirited Away</u> (Feb. 19). It all starts on Feb. 6 with an unforgettable film about the late great teacher Ram Dass—the playful and profound <u>Becoming</u> <u>Nobody</u>—followed by a Skype Q&A with producer/friend of Ram Dass Raghu Markus, and a reception.
